Many funding sources require an applicant to provide money or in-kind time or services to match a grant. Refer to the funding source for specific information on matching requirements.

1. Community Development Block Grant Program - Accessibility Modification Grant (AM)

Provides funding for projects that bring existing non-school community libraries (do not have to be municipally owned) and existing municipally owned buildings that serve a municipal function into full compliance with state and federal accessibility requirements (Vermont Access Board and Americans with Disabilities Act).

- Range: \$5,000 \$100,000 (A 10% match of cash or cash-in-kind goods or services is required for all grants)
- Eligibility: Non-municipally owned community libraries and municipal buildings only; first-come/first-serve basis; new construction is not eligible.
- Deadlines: Open application with funding decisions made throughout the year

2. Community Development Block Grant Program - Implementation Grants

Provides funding for economic development, housing, public facilities, and public services, in support of economic development or housing that will result in direct benefit to persons of low- and moderate-income, will eliminate slums or blight, or will address a community's urgent need. Projects supporting normal municipal functions are not eligible. Projects in municipal facilities are eligible if they meet the benefit requirement.

- Range: \$50,000 minimum \$500,000 or \$1,000,000 maximum (10% match required)
- The \$500,000 maximum is applicable ONLY to applications for community public facilities projects (i.e., community centers, senior centers, day care centers) and public service projects. If you have any question on whether the project under consideration is subject to the \$500,000 cap, be sure to obtain

clarification from a CD Specialist.

- Eligibility: Municipalities for eligible municipal projects and/or may apply on behalf of organizations and private owners for projects with community benefit
- Deadlines: Open application with funding decisions made throughout the year

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3. Community Development Block Grant Program -Implementation Grants: Brownfields

Provides funding for remediation and reuse of brownfield site(s).

- Range: \$200,000 to \$1,250,000 for all phases.
- Eligibility: Only available for projects with clear commitment to reoccupy and reuse the subject property,
 if the project is not eligible or appropriate for the Brownfields Revolving Load Fund or any other federal
 state brownfield funds.
- Deadlines: Open application with funding decisions made throughout the year

4. Community Development Block Grant Program -Implementation Grants: Home Access

Provides funding for to make owner-occupied homes accessible for people with disabilities.

- Range: \$5,000 minimum \$100,000 (10% match required)
- Eligibility: Must be in partnership with the Vermont Center for Independent Living. Applications must address Homes Access needs not already addressed or funded by other organizations.

5. Community Development Block Grant Program -Implementation Grants: Disaster Assistance

Provides funding to assist municipalities and residents who are victims of damage caused by floods, earthquakes, or other disaster that have been <u>declared a state of emergency by the Governor of Vermont</u>.

- Eligibility: Funds cannot be used in lieu of other federal or state funds available to assist with disaster assistance.

6. Community Development Block Grant Program - Planning Grants

Federal grants for community development planning activities and/or pre-development activities in preparation for implementing a project in one or more of the program areas (housing, economic development, public facilities, or public service). Funds allow communities access to the technical expertise and professional resources needed to test ideas, propose strategies, develop plans, establish policies and procedures, and conduct organizational activities.

- Range: \$3,000 minimum \$60,000 maximum (10% match required)
- Eligibility: Municipalities for eligible municipal projects and/or may apply on behalf of organizations and private owners for projects with community benefit. Active planning grants will bear on the competitiveness of new applications.
- Deadlines: Open application with funding decisions made throughout the year

7. Conservation Assessment Program (CAP)

The Conservation Assessment Program provides small and mid-sized museums with partial funding toward a general conservation assessment. The assessment is a study of all the collections, buildings, and building systems, as well as its policies and procedures relating to collections care. Funding is supported through a cooperative

agreement between the Foundation for Advancement in Conservation and the Institute of Museum and Library Services.

• Range: Allocation range from \$3,500 to \$3,900 and supports professional fees for a conservator (and preservation architect, if applicable) and travel costs up to museum's allocated amount.

• Eligibility:

- Unit of state/local/tribal government or private nonprofit organization with tax-exempt status under the Internal Revenue Code.
- O It must be located in one of the 50 States of the United States of America, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, the Republic of the Marshall Islands, the Federated States of Micronesia, or the Republic of Palau.
- Organized on a permanent basis for educational or aesthetic purposes; must own tangible objects and make them available to the public through exhibition and/or research on a regular basis.
- Must employ at least one full-time person who is responsible for relating the institution's governance, administration, programming, and collections management.
- o It must be possible for assessors to review all its collections and facilities in a two-day site visit.

8. Internal Revenue Service - Disabled Access Tax Credit

Federal tax credit of 50% of eligible access expenditures (architectural adaptations, equipment purchases and services like sign language interpreters) that exceed \$250 but do not exceed \$10,000. IRS Form 8826.

• Range: Up to \$5,000

• Eligibility: Small businesses with under \$1,000,000 in revenues or 30 or fewer full-time employees (Note that the credit cannot be used for the costs of new construction. It can be used only for adaptations to existing facilities.)

14. Society for Industrial Archeology: Eric DeLony Industrial Heritage Preservation Grant Fund

The Society for Industrial Archeology offers grants for the study, documentation, recordation, and/or preservation of significant historic industrial sites, structures, and objects. Contributions of in-kind services, as well as cash resources from the sponsoring and co-sponsoring agencies may qualify for matching purposes. Funds may be used for a range of projects including, but not limited to increasing public awareness of preservation efforts, photography, and videography, preparing inventories, and developing measured drawings of extant significant industrial sites, structures, maritime facilities and industrial artifacts. Grant recipients must agree to prepare a written summary of their project suitable for publication in either the SIA Newsletter and/or for *Industrial Archeology*, the Society's scholarly journal.

21. Vermont Department of Housing and Community Development - Downtown Transportation Fund

Funding supports revitalization efforts in designated Downtowns. Applications are reviewed by the Downtown Development Board and finance eligible transportation-related capital improvements in support of economic development, within or serving the downtown district. Eligible projects include but are not limited to, construction or alteration of roads and highways, parking facilities, pedestrian and streetscape improvement, rail or bus facilities or equipment, and underground relocation of electric utility, cable and telecommunications lines. Operating costs are not eligible under this fund. Awards made by the Board include grants, not to exceed 50% of the overall project cost, loans, and loan guarantees.

The Vermont Downtown Program is a Main Street America™ Coordinating Program that helps support community revitalization while preserving the historic character and enhance the future of medium to large-sized historic

centers. Since 1999 Downtown Designation has provided communities with financial incentives, training and technical assistance supporting local efforts to restore historic buildings, improve housing, design walkable communities and encourage economic development by incentivizing public and private investments.

Federal investment tax credit for 20% of the rehabilitation costs (including labor, materials and architects or other consultant fees) for income-producing buildings listed in the National Register of Historic Places. The tax credit may apply to properties such as a retail store, office building, apartment building or vacation rental. Private homes are not eligible for the credit.

30. Vermont Housing and Conservation Board

VHCB offers business planning and technical assistance services to Vermont farmers through the Vermont Farm Viability Enhancement Program. VHCB projects in the early stages of development are eligible for Feasibility Grants of up to \$10,000 to cover the costs of appraisals, options, engineering and environmental studies, or other predevelopment costs. Grants and loans are also available for the conservation of agricultural and recreational land, natural areas, historic resources, archeological sites, and for the development of housing for low and moderate-income households. Conservation/historic preservation projects may involve fee simple acquisition, purchase of conservation easements and rehabilitation. Historic buildings must be recognized to have outstanding local or regional significance, be listed in or eligible for the National Register of Historic Places, owned by a municipality or eligible non-profit, and be regularly used by the public.

Range: Up to \$150,000 – for resources considered "Local Conservation for historic/archeological resources, natural areas, or recreational lands, and up to \$215,000 for agricultural land conservation; Statewide non-farm projects are not limited by policy, but historic properties are not typically funded above \$100,000. Statewide agricultural conservation is funded up to \$500,000 per application (\$3,500 per acre) and involves a pre-application approval process. Feasibility grants are considered on an ongoing basis by VHCB staff.

31. Vermont Old Cemetery Association (VOCA) Grants

Grants are for restoration of abandoned or neglected cemeteries. Projects that include local volunteers are highly encouraged and if only volunteer labor is used, no match is required. VOCA may also provide technical assistance on restoration projects.

• Range: Up to \$750; occasionally greater amounts (25% match required)

• Eligibility: Individuals and groups interested in cemetery preservation

32. Vermont Department of Housing and Community Development – Community Recovery and Revitalization Program (CRRP)

The CRRP will provide funding for projects that spur economic recovery and revitalization in communities across the state. Eligible uses for these funds include capital improvements related to the renovation or creation of childcare and affordable housing for low and moderate income households, capital projects that assist nonprofits and small businesses in industries* most impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, and municipal water supply and wastewater projects that build housing or create jobs through business creation and expansion. These recovery funds are intended to retain and expand existing businesses and nonprofit organizations with a preference for projects that primarily serve BIPOC populations and projects located in regions and communities with declining or stagnant grand list values.

• Range: Awards will not exceed the lesser of \$1,000,000 or 20% of total project cost (there is no award minimum). However, for childcare and affordable housing projects the percentage of total project cost will be equal to the percentage of low to moderate income households served relative to the total households served up to the lesser of 20% or \$1,000,000.

33. Vermont Department of Housing and Community Development – Vermont Housing Improvement Program (VHIP)

The Vermont Housing Improvement Program (VHIP) offers grants up to \$50,000 per unit for repairs needed to bring vacant rental units up to Vermont Rental Housing Health Code guidelines, add new units to an existing building, or create an accessory dwelling unit on an owner-occupied property.

- Range: Up to \$30,000 \$50,000 depending on the type of unit.
- Eligibility:
 - Units applying for rehabilitation must have been vacant for 90 days before application to VHIP.
 - Property owners are required to match at least 20% of the grant funds, with the option for an in-kind match for unbilled services or owned materials.
 - All VHIP participants must agree to rent units at or below HUD Fair Market Rents for the County for a minimum of five years (a fair market rent calculator is included at the bottom of this page).
 - VHIP participants rehabilitating rental units or creating new units in existing, rented buildings must work with Coordinated Entry Lead Organizations to find suitable renters for at least five years.*
 - *VHIP participants creating an accessory dwelling unit (ADU) are exempt from the requirement to work with the Coordinated Entry Lead Organization and may use their preferred selection criteria in accordance with Vermont's residential rental laws.
